## Alumni donations support school activities

he 85<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Reunion was successful for many reasons, not the least of which were the donations received from alumni to support the school and various activities, such as the scholarship program. A small profit was also realized from the sale of tickets and as a result, the alumni association was able to designate some additional funds towards school activities this year. Submissions were made by various departments and following a review by alumni board members the following projects received funding. Additional requests have recently been received and decisions are pending.

Twelve maroon and white volleyballs have been purchased for use by the volleyball teams during league games and tournaments. Each volleyball bears an acknowledgement that it was donated by the alumni association, ensuring that with each spike and serve there is a visible reminder of the proud support provided by DMCI alumni to school activities.

Funding was also provided to the English Department for the purchase of an LCD projector and cart. The projector will be used by English teachers to project various web sites and information to

students during class lectures and discussions, expanding the use of the Internet as a teaching tool in the classroom and its accessibility to all students.

The donations of the projector and volleyballs were announced during a staff dinner hosted by the alumni association on November 20 at the school. The dinner was held to thank staff for their support and involvement in the 85<sup>th</sup> anniversary reunion, particularly during the Saturday afternoon Open House, where hundreds of alumni were made to feel welcome thanks to the efforts of staff and students who worked hard to create theme rooms and areas to capture the spirit and history of the school throughout the decades.

he 2008-09 school year continues at a quick pace. The Career Development program for Grade 11 and 12 students is under Semester 2. The proway once again. The students do an in-class component dealing with career searches, career interests, resumes, cover letters, and interviews. The students then go out on a 10-week practicum in a placement of their choice. Upon completion of their practicum, they complete the next in-class component consisting of preparing thank you letters to their prospective employer, resume updates, and writing a time capsule letter "Where I think or hope I will be five years from now." At the five year mark, I mail the letters back to the students. Many students have contacted me at this point and it becomes a wonderful opportunity to touch base with them once again and to find out how they are doing.

On Wednesday, November 5, 2008 DMCI was involved in Take Our Kids to Work Day. It was a very successful day. The Career Internship program starts again at the beginning of gram is composed of Grade 12 students who have applied for the program, been interviewed, and selected to participate. The students are expected to complete ca-

reer research, career interest surveys, post-secondary research, resumes, cover letters, interview techniques, and develop an employability portfolio. Students are placed with professionals such as medical researchers, lawyers, financial advisors, accountants, journalists, etc., and must complete a 30 hour practicum.

Upon completion, the students present their portfolios to independent, outside individuals who evaluate their portfolios and presentation. The Internship students then assist me in planning and delivering an Appreciation Luncheon for our mentors with entertainment provided by the Many of the mentors are alumni, but we can always use more volunteers.
